Adam Hess wins the big one Alan Hess and Johnny Walker win their flights

Winning a national championship isn't easy. Just ask someone who thought he would and had the talent to win . . . Sam Snead or Phil Mickelson might have an opinion. Snead never won a U.S. Open; Mickelson hasn't so far.

Or just ask Adam Hess. Of course, his thoughts might be a little different. Hess, quoted an a Feb. 24 Houston Chronicle article, said "I haven't played competitive golf since high school . . . my expectations were just to play good golf."

He did a little better than that, defeating Tim Scott with a par on the first hole of a sudden-death playoff to win the 2010 Golf Course Superintendents Association of America National Championship. It was the first time Hess, the youngest golfer ever to win the tournament, had entered the championship.

Hess, an assistant superintendent at Gleannloch Pines Golf Club, and Scott, golf course superintendent at Stony Creek Golf Course in Illinois, finished regulation play in the 36-hole tournament on the Greg Norman Course at PGA West in La Quinta, Calif., knotted at 1-over-par 145.

Hess was three shots off the pace heading into the final round and stumbled early in the final round, suffering a double bogey and bogey before settling in for a string of 11 consecutive pars to close out his round. Scott posted a final round 69 to force the playoff but took a bogey to Hess' par on the first extra hole, and Hess, 26 years old, had the national title.

"I just got into a good zone to get back into it," Hess said of his rally from the troubles of his first few holes in the final round, "but I was glad the playoff just went one hole. I was worried if it went any farther, he might nip me."

"It took me a couple of hours to realize I'd won," said Hess, who began playing golf at the age of 6. "It's really the only serious tournament I've ever won. It's a good feeling."

Adam Hess is, of course, the son of long time South Texas Golf Course Superintendents Association member Alan Hess, who was on hand to witness his son's triumph. Or at least part of it.

The elder Hess missed the first 16 holes of Adam's final round, having teed off two hours earlier in his quest to win the tournament's "Classic Senior II Gross" flight, which he did.


Entering his final round with a 2-stroke lead, Alan Hess also started the final day slow but played the final seven holes at The Golf Resort at Indian Wells in two strokes under par (including an eagle on his 16th hole). But his excitement was all about Adam.

"I went over to watch Adam as soon as I could," said the proud father. "When I got there, I didn't think he was even close, based on what I had heard, but then he got pars


There are more details about the tournament to be found elsewhere in this issue of *Tee to Green*, so I'm going to limit what I say about it in this space to my (and our) "thank yous."

Out of Bounds: The El Niño-Southern Oscillation phenomenon— what does it mean for Houston weather?

While most of us were battling the record heat and drought back in July 2009, who would have thought this winter would have been so cool and wet?

An El Niño was declared July 9, 2009, by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association, and those of us familiar with this phenomenon might have been a little less surprised about the sudden change in weather. By late September the drought was broken when regular rainfall and cool weather set in.

The result. Our grasses grew little in the summer, winter annual weeds arrived early, and brown patch was more severe than usual. The conditions did not provide much of a growing season this past year.

The El Niño-Southern Oscillation

(ENSO) is a term used to describe changes in surface temperatures of waters in the eastern Pacific near the equator and the associated changes in barometric pressure and wind patterns throughout the tropical regions of the Pacific Ocean. How does ENSO influence Houston's weather?

The surface water temperatures influence the position of the jet stream over North America, which, in turn, influences weather fronts during fall, winter and early spring.

Basically, we get more numerous and stronger cold fronts passing through Houston when under the influence of an ENSO. These effects typically start in October and can continue until the following May.

ENSO changes may be classified into three categories:

Hess renews professional certification

Alan D. Hess, CGCS, director of course maintenance at Augusta Pines Golf Club, Spring, Texas, has completed the renewal process for maintaining his status as a Certified Golf Course Superintendent (CGCS) with the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America (GCSAA).

Hess has been at Augusta Pines Golf Club since 1994. A 30year GCSAA member, he initially achieved his certification in 1986. Approximately 1,800 golf course superintendents worldwide currently hold "CGCS" status.

To qualify for GCSAA's new competency-based certification program, a candidate must have at least three years experience as a golf course superintendent, be employed in that capacity and meet post-secondary educational requirements and/or continuing education points.

Maintaining certified status requires renewal every five years after the initial date of certification. To fulfill certification renewal requirements, a candidate must participate in 150 hours of continuing education and professional development.

According to GCSAA CEO Mark Woodward, CGCS, "Twentyfive percent of GCSAA's Class A members have elected to earn the highest level of recognition through the professional designation "CGCS" by completion of the GCSAA Certification Program.

on17 and 18. As soon as that happened, everyone started yelling, "Playoff! Playoff!"

And the rest, as they say, is history. Better yet, the father-son duo weren't the only STGCSA members to take victories in this year's GCSAA National Championship.

Johnny Walker, the recipient of the STGCSA's 2009 Sonny DuBose Memorial Superintendent of the Year Award, won the tournament's "Classic VI Gross" flight. That's three wins for STGCSA members in one event, making the 2010 GCSAA National Championship one for the record books, at least in the southeast Texas' neck of the woods.

And it makes next year's tournament, which will be held in and around Orlando, Fla., something to anticipate.

"I think I'll be feeling a little more pressure next year," said Adam Hess, who earned a five-year exemption into the field of the prestigious Trans-Mississippi Championship for wining the GCSAA national tournament, of defending his title, "but I'm looking forward to it."





1) El Niño – temperatures in Pacific are higher than normal—expect cool wet weather.

2) Neutral - temperatures in Pacific are normal— average weather.

3) La Niña - temperatures in Pacific are lower than normal—expect warm drier weather.

Typically, the El Niño returns every two to five years. The strength of the El Niño event varies in intensity, so the next El Niño might not produce such strong deviations from "normal conditions," but weather conditions will be wetter and cooler than normal.

During an El Niño period, you might want to adjust fall and spring chemical inputs (e.g. fertilizers, pre-emergent herbicides, and fungicides) to reflect the cooler temperatures arriving early into fall and persisting later into spring.
